


World Heritage Gateway The concept

Tropical North Queensland is the only place in the world with two World Heritage areas side by side. This unique value proposition attracts more than 2.7 million visitors a year to Cairns to experience the Great Barrier Reef and the Wet Tropics rainforest. In addition to being the home of the world's largest living organism and the world's oldest tropical rainforest. Tropical North Queensland is home to the world's oldest living culture. It is the only place where both Australia's Indigenous cultures can be experienced—Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture is closely entwined with the World Heritage areas giving these extraordinary landscapes compelling stories. Tropical North Queensland is also home to a third World Heritage Area, the Riversleigh Fossil Fields in the outback.

What is missing is a central meeting point where visitors and locals can engage and be inspired to experience the diverse environments and peoples of Tropical North Queensland. A World Heritage Gateway will help people to plan and organise expeditions taking them further into the vibrant colours and life of the Great Barrier Reef and the Wet Tropics rainforest while engaging with Traditional Owners and their unique perspective. The Gateway will complement existing tours or attractions offering enhanced learning opportunities, and encouraging real life experiences.

Imagine a Traditional Owner sharing the story of how the Great Barrier Reef was formed, demonstrating the use of rainforest plants to wash your hands or singing the songlines of their country. The World Heritage Gateway will not only be a compelling, inspiring and engaging visitor experience, but presented in an amazing and architecturally outstanding building, will become an attraction in its own right and a must-do bucket list experience. It is proposed that the Gateway will celebrate the region's World Heritage values and profile Australia's other World Heritage areas plus World Heritage sites around the world. In this way, the Gateway will become a truly international experience hosting presentations and displays from around the world, which will enhance the visitor experience and create new business for the city's Convention Centre, accommodation, restaurants and tours. In a vibrant tourism destination like Cairns, the Gateway will be a destination-defining project that could help to cement Cairns as a world class tropical city. In addition, the Gateway has the potential to be the focal point for the proposed Global Tourism Hub planned for the city—a focal point that leverages the region's key competitive advantages of the Great Barrier Reef and Wet Tropics World Heritage areas and the strong linkages to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures.

Global Tourism Hub fit

The World Heritage Gateway will draw additional visitors to the Hub and is an ideal fit for an accessible, high-quality public space. It celebrates Cairns' natural and cultural values, linking the waterfront with the city.

It matches the top five public wants outlined in the Tropical North Global Tourism Hub Community Consultation Report:

- long-term operational jobs for Cairns and Far North locals
- investment in environmental improvement and best practice World Heritage management
- investment in new tourism opportunities for the local area
- improved patronage of existing local restaurants and businesses
- new public open spaces on the Global Tourism Hub site and associated public access.

The Gateway presents an opportunity to create the world's best World Heritage centre. Its strength is the Gateway's broad appeal to different visiting audiences drawn by the iconic Great Barrier Reef and the Wet Tropics rainforest.

The Gateway functions as a hub and key reference point for visitors and locals. It provides direct access to rich information, plus orientation, guidance, learning and engagement for people to then explore the area with a deeper appreciation of what to see and why it is so unique.

It offers a night-time experience and an evening focal point for a cross section of visitors. It also serves to promote visitor dispersal to support access to previously unexplored wilderness areas, and provides opportunities for Aboriginal communities through culture, art, guided interpretive experiences and storytelling. The linkages it will create with the vibrant, nature-based tourism sector will stimulate further jobs growth.

The Gateway has already been identified as one of Queensland Government's top 10 most significant tourism development opportunities. It will bring a fresh, new-world development showcasing Queensland's natural beauty and Indigenous cultures, further strengthening Queensland's tourism offering.

Business model

The World Heritage Gateway meshes extremely well with Queensland Government expectations of what a tourism precinct can offer. It provides for:

- a significant entertainment, recreational and/or cultural facility
- the construction of a unique, internationally-recognisable architecture with expansive high amenity public realm
- provision of meeting and conference facilities
- the capacity to incorporate a museum facility and interpretive displays that showcase the community and natural and cultural values of the region.

The Gateway concept will also integrate well with the proposed expansion of the Cairns Convention Centre and the proposed siting of the Global Tourism Hub in the Cairns Wharf area—the arrival point for many visitors.

Quality hands-on experiences in the Gateway will serve as a valuable resource to visitors, not only providing interesting information, but also inspiring and motivating them to explore the destination more deeply.

The Gateway will offer a broad range of potential free, user-pays and commercial opportunities including cross-selling existing local attractions, a retail outlet, sponsorships and commissions to support the operational and maintenance costs of the centre.



• Cairns has an international airport, well-established transport networks and significant existing tourism infrastructure with identified growth potential. It also has a strong economy, highly skilled and multicultural population, excellent education and training institutions, and its standing as a clean and green regional city is internationally recognised.

600+ tours depart Cairns daily to the reef, rainforest and outback.

On an average day, **one in six** people is a visitor who **stays more than five days in the region**.

The Great Barrier Reef was among the first three Australian inscriptions on the World Heritage register in 1981. The Wet Tropics World Heritage Area was inscribed in 1988. The two World Heritage areas sit side by side—a unique phenomenon—and visiting both is a real bucket-list experience.
